


One Broadcast Engineers Perspective since September 1986

Interestingly fire was way down the disaster list...As was the use of broadcasting. This little section of this article needs to get to these senators and congressmen who are on this AM in every car movement.

Perhaps, maybe - FM Stations will be able to increase their HD power levels...> IF < the FCC approves. Check out MB Docket # 22-405 for more details. Certain, if the Commish approves, it will be in all the major media publications. Right now, to the best of my knowledge, KING-FM is the only station in the Seattle area that's already doing it on an experimental basis - If the rules change, it will become a blanket authorization.

In the category of - Goodbye old friend -



The Department of Energy approved new rules for light bulbs last year that took effect on August 1, including a new minimum standard for light bulbs at 45 lumens—or brightness—per watt, an increase over the average 12 to 18 lumens per watt for incandescent bulbs.

This only involves the manufacturing and selling of new bulbs....You can still use those that you have already purchased and, purchase news ones for use in appliances, traffic signals, plant lights and, of course - Tower Lighting. I my travels, I can't help but notice all the towers that are still light with Light-Bulbs and not LED's.

According to the Feds....LED's use, at least, 75% less energy and last up to 25 times longer. I often used 'current-sensors' in constructing tower light monitoring equipment. Where I would use a 20 amp sensor, after the change, it was replaced with a 2 amp model.

LED lamps may save money, however, they often are the source of Radio Frequency Interference....Just ask any Ham that operates H.F. But like many things these days, sadly, RFI is not high on the FCC's agenda.

Here's another thing to think about ... Apparently the miles and miles of abandoned, lead covered, telephone cables are contaminating soil and waterways, according to a piece in the Wall Street Journal. I can't see our telephone companies doing much about this - on their own.

When you reach my age, you start thinking about dementia. I am happy to report that I don't appear to have it (so far). According to an article in NextAvenue.org, there are some things you can do to protect you from it.

Perhaps you have heard someone say they have decided to keep working beyond retirement age to 'keep their mind sharp'? It appears that notion has some science behind it.

Three researchers at the Max Planck Institute for Demographic Research in Germany have released a study showing measurable differences in cognitive decline between those who bow out of the workforce earlier versus later in life. Some of the differences were stark.

Perhaps I should note that there are certain, high-profile, people in public life that appear to be struggling in this area. Certainly being able to keep your very-personal computer operating at a high level depends on a lot of factors, some of them you have no control over.

- ➤ Being positive can be very beneficial as well. How we respond to challenges has much to do with our brain health and longevity.
- A sense of purpose is also vital. Many times people will become disconnected and, therein, lose their sense of purpose leading to their decline.
- ➤ Happiness in what you are doing is also vital...Doing what you love is a bonus. Doing something you don't like, especially later in life, is a call for re-direction.
- Recently I was chatting on the phone with a well-known person in our industry (he likes to point out we are of similar age) ...Clearly he, like me, does have to keep working, however he enjoys the challenges that come with doing so.

➤ Will this make us live longer? Perhaps not, however, we are likely happier and morehealthy until that time comes, as it does for us all.

In the past, I have been asked to climb towers. (No, I don't do it anymore, except for my own tower at home). Many would never dream of climbing a tower due to their fear of heights. Forbes Health says about 3-6% of those that have a fear of heights suffer from what's known as acrophobia. Neurologists believe they have pinpointed what happens in our brain. The findings suggest that (here it comes) the 'basolateral amygdala (BLA) is responsible for the way we experience the fear of heights. Now, don't you feel better knowing this?

As we get closer to the end of summer - changes start to show themselves in the changing of colors. This picture from one of the West Tiger tower cameras is looking east just after sunrise. Note how the golds are replacing the greens. Yes, I'd still much rather drive up here than sit in traffic in the city.

With that being said - The construction on SR-18 between Tiger Summit and I-90 has resulted in the route being restricted to two-lanes with speed reductions and with that, long slow backups.



Here is an overhead view of Tiger Summit, elevation 1377ft. SR-18 here is 4-lanes. The parking area on the north side of the highway is frequently packed with vehicles associated with those that recreate in the Tiger Mountain State Forest. The road going up to the right is the route to the broadcast and electronic sites on the summits of Tiger, some 6 1/2 miles from here.

In the next couple of years this intersection will be dramatically changed by eliminating the ability to cross over west-bound SR18 to go east. This is likely to eliminate a lot of accidents that have taken place, over the years, at this location.

Something you don't see very often - The launch of an HD4 signal - Bustos Media did it in Milwaukee, WI with their 104.7 FM.




In the past I have written about adaptors of various type....Are you ready for an 'F to RJ45'?

Here on August 3rd, Water Buffalo is doing just that. Just so happened that this was prior to wildfire smoke and Mt Rainier was in great form.





Last month I posted this picture and posed this question -


Anyone know what these flowers are? Found a lot of them growing near the KVTI Transmitter in Lakewood.



Lowell Kiesow correctly answered with the following -



I wished I had this item back when I was teaching electronics.




Often a model is used when pictures of industry are taken.

Obviously, they don't have to know anything about what they are doing or how to do it.




Time to check your vision.


Here's one for your eyes.....Do you see 4 perfectly round circles?
